Retreat Week Five My Identity as a Child of God

Looking at our sins can be challenging. When we approach God with our sins, sometimes it can be consoling to bring along our Mother, the Blessed Virgin Mary, and her Son, Jesus. This week's retreat talk breaks open Ignatius's prayer method called the Triple Colloquy, or Conversation, with Mary, Jesus, and God. It is a prayer method that helps us remember we are never alone!

THE TRIPLE COLLOQUY

The First Colloquy: MARY, OUR MOTHER

Oh, Blessed Mary, please open my eyes so I can recognize sin clearly. Give me the ability to see and feel the harm caused by it. Fill me with a willingness to change anything that needs to change. Increase my discernment so that I experience a deeper and deeper understanding of my sin and sinfulness.

The Second Colloquy: JESUS

Jesus, I come to you with Mary, our Mother, by my side, please open my eyes so I can recognize sin clearly. Give me the ability to see and feel the harm caused by it. Fill me with a willingness to change anything that needs to change. Increase my discernment so that I experience a deeper and deeper understanding of my sin and sinfulness.

Pray the Anima Chrisi (CLICK HERE FOR THE ANIMA CHRISTI)

The *Anima Christi* is a beautiful prayer to help us give thanks to Christ for His Passion, Death, and Resurrection. This prayer also asks Jesus for the grace to stay close to Him and for His protection against all evil. We also ask Jesus in this prayer to call us to be with Him for all eternity. And as we prepare our colloquy to go to God, this prayer gives us strength and hope, and reminds us of God's Faith and Love in us, and us in God.

The Third Colloquy: GOD

Oh my God, I come to you with Mary, our Mother at one side and Christ Jesus on the other, please open my eyes so I can recognize sin clearly. Give me the ability to see and feel the harm caused by it. Fill me with a willingness to change anything that needs to change. Increase my discernment so that I experience a deeper and deeper understanding of my sin and sinfulness.

At the conclusion of this prayer, take a moment to tune into your heart, to check-in with your interior, to see if God has impressed anything upon you.

Then end this prayer with an Our Father.
